


## Meet the staff

Attendance and punctuality are enormously important elements of school life: previous years, when schools have had to be closed due to government directives, have seen pupils miss large chunks of their education. Returning to normality has been hard for many families and children and that is why we have recognised attendance as a key school priority.

This year, we have increased the length of our school day, to enhance the learning time and opportunities for our children: the doors open daily at 8:40am and registration takes place at 8:50am. The start of the day is a vital time to welcome our children into school, review previous learning and get them ready for the day ahead. We found these earlier opening times, used to avoid crowding over the past couple of years, brought a calmer start to the school day.

Having reviewed attendance data for the same period of time last year, we are delighted to report that our overall attendance Attendance Matters has improved. Our aim is to reach the 96% expectation set nationallv, and whilst we are not vet at that point, we are delighted that
