## **School Attendance**

As you aware from your parent information packs, improving rates of attendance and punctuality is one of our school improvement priorities this year. The reason for this is that rates of attendance across the school has declined since the COVID 19 pandemic. Whilst COVID absences in previous years were unavoidable, close analysis of data shows that many of the reasons for absence had no relation to COVID.

The evidence about attendance and attainment shows us that pupils with the highest attainment at the end of Year 6 have higher rates of attendance compared to those with the lowest attainment. Attendance at school is essential to ensure pupils get the most out of their school experience, including their attainment, wellbeing, and wider life chances.

The guidance from the Department for Education is clear. Schools have a continuing responsibility to manage and improve attendance. Ofsted also evaluate the extent to which pupils in school have high levels of attendance and punctuality.

As part of our attendance strategy we will be continuing to monitor attendance closely this half term. In addition to our end of term attendance celebrations, at the end of the term all parents will receive an update which indicates their child's attendance level so far this academic year and how this level compares to the nationally expected level.

School have an excellent relationship with many families for whom attendance poses a challenge. If any other families would like additional support or guidance this can be accessed by contacting Mrs Barlow.
