

Should I keep my

child off school?



Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over	
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode	
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19.	
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics	
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared	
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started	
Scabies	they've had their first treatment	
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics	
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics


Try these talk tasks at home...

Oracy home learning challenge



That's not my...

Practice the physical and linguistic strands of the Oracy Framework by bringing to life your very own version of the well-known That's Not My... stories.



Follow the instructions on the right to create your own That's Not My... story. Once you have made your stencil, take it with you on a walk outside or around your house. Place it on as many different surfaces as you can, using interesting adjectives to describe your character's cut-out feature e.g. "That's not my snail, it's shell is too prickly"

Don't forget to think about the Oracy Framework!



What tone of voice will you use to read your "That's not my..." phrase? Make sure you speak loudly and clearly!



What words will you use to describe your stencil's cut-out feature? How will you use your physical oracy to emphasise your chosen adjective?

How to make your stencil



- A piece of card
- A felt tip pen
- A pair of scissors
- An adult to help



1.Choose an animal or an



object and draw onto a piece of card



2. With an adult's help, cut out a key feature



3.Place your stencil different surfaces and choose adjectives to describe the cut-out feature e.g. That's not my butterfly, it's wings are too leafy


